REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE ON THE DELAYED PAYMENT OF CONTRACTORS HIRED BY UNRA.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Rt. Hon. Speaker and Hon. Members,

On 4th May 2022, Hon. Richard Sebamala, MP, Bukoto Central in Masaka District raised a Matter of National Importance in regard to Budget suppression particularly in the Road Sector where he stated that this has caused accumulation of arrears to the tune of **UGX. 334 million per day** from obligations owed to contractors hired by Uganda National Roads Authority (UNRA). The Rt. Hon. Speaker directed the Committee on Physical Infrastructure to investigate the matter.

Rules 187 (f) and 189 provide for the jurisdiction and mandate of the Committee respectively; to cover the sectors of Lands, Housing, Urban Development, Physical Planning, Works and Transport:

- examine and comment on policy matters affecting the Ministries covered by it;
- ii. initiate or evaluate action programmes of Ministries and Sectors and make appropriate recommendations on them;
- iii. monitor the performance of Ministries, Departments and Agencies;
- iv. monitor Government compliance with approved plans and programmes; and
- v. monitor the progress on implementation of the sustainable development goals made by sectors that fall within its jurisdiction.

It is against this background that the Committee proceeded to interrogate the debts owed by Government to construction companies hired by UNRA and the attendant interest charged on the Consolidated Fund arising therefrom. The Committee also concurrently considered a petition to the Rt. Hon Speaker from Uganda National Association of Building and Civil Engineering Contractors (UNABCEC) on delayed payment of contractors who are members of the Association.

The committee now presents its report to this House for consideration.

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2.0 METHODOLOGY

The Committee:

- Perused the Hansard of 4th May 2022.
- ii. Held a meeting with Ministry of Works and Transport and UNRA.
- iii. Held a meeting with Uganda National Association of Building and Civil Engineering Contractors (UNABCEC).
- iv. Held a meeting with the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development.
- v. Perused the Public Procurement and Disposal of Assets Act (2003) as amended and the PPDA guidelines (2014.)

3.0 SUBMISSIONS FROM STAKEHOLDERS

The Committee received submissions from stakeholders as follows:

A. Submission from UNABCEC (Appendix I)

UNABCEC is a non-profit, member driven, National Trade Association of over 396 Contractors, and other organizations engaged in the construction sector in Uganda. The core purpose of the organization is commitment to improve performance in the construction industry by championing better regulation and enhancing operational integrity.

UNABCEC raised the following issues:

i. Delayed payments is the major factor that negatively affects local contractors. UNRA the major employer of UNABCEC members owes them over UGX. 500 Billion in arrears as at 11th May 2022. The other Government entities that also owe UNABCEC members include Ministry of Works and Transport, Ministry of Water and Environment, Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education and Sports; and various District Local Governments.

Consequently:

a. Some members are losing the security they used to acquire loans to execute the Government projects.

b. Contractors have been frustrated and hindered from performing ongoing works thus failing to pay workers, taxes and other statutory obligations like NSSF, insurance and other partnership commitments.

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- c. Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) penalties have overwhelmingly accrued due to delay of payments of the requisite taxes like VAT.
- d. Commercial Banks are losing confidence in government-funded projects due to contractual breach. This has made the projects less competitive and more expensive.
- e. Continued delay of payments to contractors suppresses related manufacturing and smaller businesses along the supply chain.
- f. There is limited participation of local contractors in Uganda's public procurement. This has increasingly exposed Ugandans to exploitation by foreigners.
- g. Government's delay to pay Local Contractors has frustrated the growth of its own national providers, contrary to the objectives of Vision 2040 and the NDPIII.

UNABCEC prayed that:

- i. A supplementary budget be approved to enable payment of all outstanding arrears to contractors.
- ii. Government through the MoFPED should:
 - a. Fast-track the reversal of the budget cut, and reinstate the 40% budget to those MDAs responsible for infrastructure development.
 - b. Issue a commitment letter to UNABCEC as a tool to restore confidence in Banks and other suppliers owed by UNABCEC members until outstanding payments are made.
 - c. Engage the management of Bank of Uganda to relieve pressure on nonperforming loans by contractors. The Bank should allow loan restructuring to contractors; a moratorium for a given period to relieve contractors of the burden.
 - d. Instruct URA and NSSF to negotiate with contractors on flexible payment terms and allow a grace period to distressed contractors who are just recovering from COVID-19.
- iii. Direct Government entities employing construction contractors to undertake the following short term measures;
 - a. Waiver of liquidated damages.
 - b. Waiver on extension of performance bondswhile allowing re-negotiation of existing contracts under an agreed formula based on current increase in construction inputs.

c. Consider Force Majeure as a last option.

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B. Submission from Uganda National Roads Authority.

Uganda National Roads Authority highlighted the following issues:

- i. Government decision to suppress the budget for the Financial Year 2021/22 by 40% due to poor revenue performance and effects of COVID-19 pandemic came when UNRA had already signed contracts that could not be revoked and or was at advanced stages of procurement.
- ii. Some of the contracts were for construction of broken bridges, swamp crossings and consultancies for projects whose contracts were on going.
- iii. As at 11th May, 2022 deficit stood at UGX. 573.3 Billion and was accruing interest of UGX. 235.6 million per day at a rate of 15% per annum.
- Interest rates for failure to meet obligations by the employer are iv. embedded in the respective contracts.
- 68% of the debt was owed to international contractors and 32% to local ٧. contractors.
- vi. The arrearswere projected to grow to UGX. 585.08 Billion at the end of the Financial Year 2021/22; with the interest growing to UGX. 240.4 million per day if no efforts were made to clear them.

C. Submission from the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic **Development (MoFPED)**

(Appendix II)

MoFPED informed the Committee that:

- i. There was delay to pay contractors due to revenue shortfall arising out of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- When the issue on delayed payment was received from Parliament, the ii. Ministry subsequently requested the Accounting Officers to provide details of affected contractors including the amount owed to each of them, nationality and evidence of outstanding certificates.

Additionally, in the Minister's letter to the Rt. Hon Speaker Ref. ISS 59/255/01 dated 23rd May 2022, the Minister submitted details of the

affected contractors and outstanding certificates amounting to **UGX** 840,868,471,074 as submitted by the respective Accounting Officers.

At the time of appropriation of the budget for FY 2021/22 the budgetary allocations for all votes were premised on the assumption that the economy would recover and help generate UGX. 22.425 Trillion from domestic revenues.

However, within the first quarter of execution of the budget, it became evident that the economy continued to suffer the after effects of COVID-19 lockdown and Government was expected to record shortfalls in revenue amounting to UGX 2 Trillion.

- iii. During the peak of COVID-19 pandemic, Government had increased its borrowing to 49.8% of GDP leaving little room to cover revenue shortfall with debt financing given the 50% of GDP ceiling agreed with Parliament in the Charter of Fiscal Responsibility.
- iv. To accommodate the revenue shortfalls, Cabinet effected a 40% suppression of the Government of Uganda Budget excluding wage for all votes. Accounting Officers were accordingly advised to revise their work plans to avoid over commitment by Government through the accumulation of arrears of contractors and suppliers.
- v. Since the economy had shown signs of improvement with the re-opening in January 2022, Government shortfalls were projected at UGX. 1.6 Trillion compared to UGX. 2 Trillion in the first quarter of FY 2021/22.

The Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development therefore sought a Cabinet decision to unfreeze the Budget suppression of some of the votes affected by the outstanding obligations to contractors basing on submissions received from the Accounting Officers as summarized in the Table below:-

From Table 2 above the roads subsector received UGX 586,917,860,123.

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Consequently, the Ministry;

- Pledged to settle the remaining obligations as first call on the budget for FY 2022/23.
- b. Advised all Accounting Officers to desist from entering into new contracts before the clearance of the debts owed to Contractors.

4.0 OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

4.1 On concerns from the House:

The main concern from the House as referred to the Committee for scrutiny was; "Delayed payments to contractors leading to high interest charges to Government"

The Committee observed that:

- a. There was delay to pay Certificates and invoices to contractors hired by UNRA due to revenue shortfall arising out of the COVID-19 pandemic which caused arrears with attendant interest of **UGX 235.6 Million** per day contrary to **UGX 334 Million** per day as stated by Hon. Sebamala Richard; from an obligation of UGX 573.3Bn as at 11th May, 2022.
- b. At the end of FY 2021/22, Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development had made efforts to release additional UGX 688,178,860,123 for various Votes, under which the Ministry of Works received UGX 132,343,860,123, Ministry of Water and Environment UGX 101,261,000,000, Uganda National Roads Authority UGX 352, 686,000,000 and Uganda Road Fund UGX 101,888,000,000.

Out of the additional release of UGX 688,178,860,123, the roads subsector received UGX 586,917,860,123.

c. The Committee observed that since interim payment Certificates and invoices are raised from time to time the obligation owed to UNRA by 27th September, 2022, was UGX 832.026 Bn out of which local contractors' Certificates and invoices amount UGX 115 Bn.

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The Committee further observed that:

- i. There were delays to pay outstanding Certificates and invoices due to the effects of Covid 19 pandemic which affected revenue collection. This consequently led to budget suppression by a 40% cut across various votes.
- ii. UNRA's delay to pay the arrears would continue to cause Government to incur nugatory expenditure.
- iii. The non-operationalization of the Road Fund to the 2nd Generation by Government has been the cause of the piece meal funding to the Roads Sector and the delayed payment to contractors.

The Committee therefore recommends that:

- a. To avoid payment of accumulated interest, Government should endeavor to prioritize funds meant for meeting contractual obligations because the interest rate on arrears of Certificates and invoices is quite high.
- b. In order to curb the ongoing hemorrhage of financial resources from Government, MoFPED should endeavor to honor its commitment to clear the debts owed to contractors as a first call in the first quarter of the following financial year.
- c. Government should prioritize operationalization of the Road Fund as a second generation fund to address the issues of suppressions in funding of road maintenance.

4.2 UNABCEC Concerns

The Committee observed that;

i. The 40% budget cut to MDAs responsible for infrastructure development significantly affected their planned outputs which consequently led to their inefficiency and ineffectiveness.

The Committee therefore recommends that Government increases funding to the Ministries that were affected by the 40% cut in the previous year, 2021/22 in order to cover for the deficit accrued in the infrastructure development.

ii. The Committee observed that UNABCEC being a bridge between the Construction Industry and Government has been overwhelmed by

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complaints from its Members accruing from delayed payments that have consequently led to hindrances by contractors to perform on-going works and other obligations.

The Committee recommends that Government clears all outstanding obligations to UNABCEC members and other contractors owed. This will also go a long way in ensuring that the good working relationship between UNABCEC and Government is maintained.

- iv. The Committee further observed that some UNABCEC member accounts have been seized or frozen by URA due to accumulated tax penalties as a result of delays to remit VAT with penalties and a monthly 2% interest on tax arrears.
- v. The Committee observed that Commercial Banks who are the main financiers of the construction industry are losing confidence in Government funded projects due to contractual breach by Government making the projects less competitive and very expensive. Further the pressure from Commercial Banks on the loans undertaken is over whelming.

The Committee recommends and urges Government clear the outstanding obligations owed to construction contractors.

4.3 GENERAL OBSERVATION AND RECOMMENDATION

Need to protect Local Contractors

The Committee appreciated the concerns of UNABCEC in regard to the need to protect the local contractors. It was noted that delayed payments by Government to local contractors had led to the collapse of many local companies.

The Committee observed that the collapse of the contractors derailed Uganda's journey towards the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 1,8 and 9 as well as contradicting the objectives of Vision 2040 and the NDPIII.

SDG 1 advocates for no poverty by 2030 and SDG 8 for decent work and economic growth within the same period. The collapse of the contractors leaves some of them without a source of income, indebted and their former employees jobless. This predisposes both categories of people to poverty. The collapse of the contractors also jeopardizes Uganda's realization of SDG 9 that advocates for industry, innovation and infrastructure development by 2030. The fact that

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the contractors are unable to deliver on the expected contracts, infrastructure development is delayed.

The Committee recommends that Uganda should at all times be seen to be committed to attaining the SDGS to which she is signatory and achieving its objectives in Vision 2040 and NDPIII.

5.0 CONCLUSION

The Committee noted that the delay in clearance of Certificates and invoices was caused majorly by underperformance of revenue collection resulting from the effects of Covid-19 pandemic which led to budget suppression in various votes. However, Government made efforts to clear some of the obligations when revenue performance improved. Government is therefore urged to always honour its obligations in time in order to avoid accrued interest and nugatory expenditures. Government should also prioritize operationalization of the Road Fund as a second generation fund to address the issues of suppressions in funding of road maintenance.

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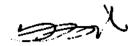

REF: DELAYED PAYMENTS TO CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTORS

Please refer to your letter Ref: AB 288/499/01 of 06th May 2022 (attached hereto as ANNEX 1 for ready reference), which was consequent to our letter to the RT Hon Speaker of the Partiament of Uganda on the subject matter (Ref: UNAB/ADV/PARU04/2022/007 of the 27th April 2022 attached as ANNEX 2 hereto).

We thank you for the opportunity extended to us to present the challenges that our members are currently facing on government of Uganda contracts.

INTRODUCTION:

As you are well aware Hon, Chairman, in the Construction Industry, the private sector of consists of two sub-sectors; namely:

- 1) The Engineering design and Supervision services comprised of Consulting Engineers, Architects, and Surveyors among other professionals, and
- The Physical Construction/Execution comprised of Contractors, mainly represented by Uganda National Association of Building and Civil Engineering Contractors (UNABCEC)

Uganda National Association of Building and Civil Engineering Contractors (UNABCEC) is a 29-year-old non-profit, member-driven, national trade association of over 396 Genuine Contractors, and other Companies and Organizations engaged in Construction Sector in Uganda. Our core purpose is commitment to improve performance in the Construction Industry by championing better regulation and enhancing operational integrity.

The association is dedicated to fostering growth and sustainability in the ever-changing environment of Commercial Construction Contractors, improving job site safety, expanding in the asset of culting edge technologies and techniques and strengthening the relationships between Contractors, Clients and Government. Therefore, being the principle interface.

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between the Construction Industry on one hand, the public, development partners and the Government on the other.

CONCERNS:

Hon. Chairman and Members of the Committee, the Contractors are ailing, as they are faced with grave challenge of delayed payments, especially on Government Projects, which we bring for your practical interventions.

Delayed payments has been and continues to be the major factor that is negatively affecting the Local Contractors. For example, Uganda National Roads Authority (UNRA), which is the major employer of our members in road construction, has over UGX 500Bn in arrears to Local Contractors, since January 2021 (Please refer to ANNEX 3 here(o). Other MDAs with delayed payments to contractors include, among others; Ministry of Works and Transport, Ministry of Water and Environment, Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education and Sports, and various District Local Governments.

As you will further appreciate Hon. Chairman and Members of the Committee, because of delayed Payments, the undesired outcomes include but without limit to following:

- 1) Our members are losing everything they used as security to acquire loans to execute government projects.
- 2) By this act (delayed payments), the Contractors have been frustrated and hindered from performing of ongoing works and other obligations, and have thus been disallowed from generating requisite revenue to pay workers, taxes and other statutory obligations like NSSF, insurance, servicing bank loans (with associated compounding interests) and other partnership commitments.
- 3) Overwhelming accumulated tax penalties. In that, irrespective of the above persistent challenge, Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) is continuously harassing our members on account of delay to remit Value Added Tax (VAT), with penalties and a monthly 2% interest on tax arrears. URA demands remittance of VAT immediately after generating an e-invoice or risk incurring interest. This is yet additional strain on our members' cash flows, and forced some of their accounts to be seized/frozen by URA and running into receivership. Other members have failed to get Transactional Tax Clearances from the entity, denying tax payers a chance to do business unfairly.

4) Commercial Banks, who are the main financiers of the industry are losing confidence in government funded projects due to contractual breach by government. This has made the projects less competitive hence more expensive.

The negative effect of delayed payment to Suppliers,

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6) Continued non-payment severely hurts construction companies and triggers a downstream spiral, with the negative effect; suppressing related manufacturing and smaller businesses along the supply chain.

- 7) Limited participation of Local Contractors in Uganda's public procurement, which would have been the bulwark against foreign exploitation, and which is very bad for the economy.
- 8) By not paying Local Contractors, government is frustrating the growth of its own National Providers, which is contrary the objectives of Vision 2040, and associated NDP III

Because these factors Hon Chair and Members, Contractors have lost credibility before associated stakeholders, because they have been excluded from fair treatment by its own government. Hence, our members have been frustrated from fulfilling its commitments and cannot continue with it operations, since the government is responsible for this grave breach of trust and its obligations to Contractors—by not paying for works offered; especially National Providers. A number of contractors will soon resort to litigation and/or termination of ongoing contracts if nothing is done to immediately change the status quo.

Permit us further, to draw your attention to selected members who have been severely hurt by delayed payments. (Please refer to ANNEX 4 hereto)

Honorable members, as you will appreciate, with strained cash flow, our members are up against the increase in prices of Construction Inputs. The skyrocketing prices of Fuel/Diesel, cement, reinforcements of these major inputs have are additional burden to Contractors. Diesel for example have shot from UGX 3,490 in November 2021 to over UGX 5,400 at the fall of April 2022; over 53 percentile increase in a space of 6 months, which has affected all other construction materials. While Contractors will need deliberate cushion against ongoing contracts with government entities that were signed before the current inflation, this increase in cost of production could have been mitigated had payments been timely

RECOMMENDATIONS:

UNABCEC, recommends the following to cushion our members against the challenges being faced due to delayed payments:

1) Approval of supplementary budget, to enable Ministry of Finance Planning and Economic Development to pay all outstanding arrears to contractors.

Government, through the Ministry of Finance Planning and Economic Development should;

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 Fast-track the reversal of the budget cut, and reinstate the 40% budget cuts to those MDAs responsible for infrastructure development,

- ii) Issue a commitment letter to UNABCEC as a tool to restore confidence in Banks and other Suppliers owed by UNABCEC Members until all outstanding payments are made.
- iii) Engage the management of Bank of Uganda to relieve pressure on non-performing loans by Contractors. The Bank should allow loan restructuring to contractors; a moratorium for a given period to relieve contractors of the burden, and
- iv) Instruct Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) and National Social Security Fund (NSSF) to negotiate with contractors on flexible payment terms and allow grace period to distressed contractors who are just recovering for effects of COVID 19.
- Direct government entities employing construction contractors to undertake the following short-term measures;
 - i) Waiver off Liquidated Damages: Because of delayed payments, most contractors have been and are still struggling to complete ongoing projects by borrowing expensively and in the process going beyond the contract period. In these circumstances, we find it unfair to charge them liquidated damages. It is our humble request that liquidated damages arising from delayed payments be waived and the period for underperforming contracts be reviewed until the situation returns to normal.
 - ii) Waiver on Extension of Performance Bonds: Contractors are struggling to perform and because of delay to meet their financial obligations, commercial banks have become adamant to extend their performance bonds. As a result, some contractors' payment certificates have been bounced by these entities because of expired performance bonds. We request that the extension of performance bonds be waived until when the situation improves.
 - iii) Allow renegotiation of existing contracts under an agreed formula based on the current increase in construction inputs since the existing conditions have a direct impact on projects. "Force Majeure" could also be considered as a last option.

CONCLUSION:

Honorable Members, we trust that you know that the Construction Sector represents the backbone of most developing economies, as it provides the foundation for infrastructure development, thereby acting as a driver and multiplier for all other economic sectors that

rely on such infrastructure. Besides being the 2nd biggest employing industry after Agriculture, it also contributes more than 12% to the Gross Domestic Product and it is therefore critical that it functions efficiently.

We therefore believe that the above proposed recommendations shall enable the sector flourish without compromising government's agenda.

INTRODUCTION:

RT Hon. Speaker, Permit us to congratulate you on your well-deserved elections earlier this year and we wish you well in all your endeavors.

Uganda National Association of Building and Civil Engineering Contractors (UNABCEC), RT Hon. Speaker, is a 29-year-old non-profit, member-driven, national trade association of over 396 Genuine Contractors, and other Companies and Organizations engaged in Construction Sector in Uganda. Our core purpose is commitment to improve performance in the Construction Industry by championing better regulation and enhancing operational integrity.

The association is dedicated to fostering growth and sustainability in the ever-changing environment of Commercial Construction Contractors, improving job site safety, expanding the use of cutting edge technologies and techniques and strengthening the relationships between Contractors, Clients and Government. Therefore, being the principle interface between the Construction Industry on one hand, the public, development partners and the Government on the other.

We aspire: "To be the lead engine for growth and development of the construction industry in the region." To that end, we are committed: "To promote and protect the shared interests of Members, and the Construction Industry as a whole, through Mobilization, Advocacy, Networking, and Innovative Service Provision".

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CONCERNS:

The subject issue, RT Hon, Speaker are the challenges that UNABCEC Members, and the Construction Industry as a whole are facing, because of delayed payments from Government.

Delayed payments has been and continues to be one of the major factors limiting participation of local contractors in Uganda's public procurement. Besides the overwhelming accumulated tax penalties and interests from banks, suppliers and other service providers, our members are currently risking losing everything they used as security to acquire loans to execute government projects. Continued non-payment severely hurts construction companies and triggers a downstream spiral negative effect of suppressing related manufacturing and smaller businesses along the supply chain.

A case in point is Uganda National Roads Authority, the major employer of our members dealing in road construction, which has over UGX500Bn in arrears to local contractors dating January 2021. The situation, RT. Hon. Speaker, is getting out of hand, as contractors will be left with no option but to seek legal or worse, industrial action against government if nothing is done to immediately address this matter.

Whereas we recognize the current financial constraints faced by the government as evidenced by the recent budget cuts, we trust that you know that the Construction Sector represents the backbone of most developing economies, as it provides the foundation for infrastructure development, thereby acting as a driver and multiplier for all other economic sectors that rely on such infrastructure. It also contributes more than 12% to the Gross Domestic Product and it is critical that it functions efficiently. We therefore believe that solutions that can enable the sector flourish without compromising government's agenda can be found.

It is also worth noting that UNABCEC has made several engagements with the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development about the matter but these have unfortunately yielded no positive results. Particular reference is made to our meeting of 16th March 2021 with Hon. Matia Kasaija, Minister of Finance Planning and Economic Development in which the Minister pledged to;

 Release the remaining 25% of the approved budget for the third quarter of the FY2021/22 to MOAs in 2 weeks' time (from the date of the meeting) to enable them pay relative proportion to Contractors.

- 2) In the next cabinet sitting (within the two weeks from the date of the meeting), urge a reversal of the budget cut, to reinstate the 40% budget cuts to those MDAs responsible for infrastructure development, so as to settle the arrears to Contractors.
- Issue a commitment letter to UNABCEC as a tool to restore confidence in Banks and other Suppliers owed by UNABCEC Members, and
- 4) Engage the Bank of Uganda to relieve pressure on non-performing loans by Contractors

Sadly, it is more than five weeks later, and none of the above pledges have been fulfilled. Madam RT Hon. Speaker, by this acts (and/or the lack of action by Government) that Contractors have been frustrated and hindered from performance of ongoing works and other obligations, and have thus been disallowed from generating requisite revenue to pay works, pay suppliers, payment of taxes' areas, and servicing bank loans (against which Contractors are in the verge of losing their assets). Consequently, Contractors have lost credibly before associated stakeholders, and have been excluded from fair treatment by its own government. Hence, our members cannot maintain operations since government has become culpable by this grave breach of its obligations to Contractors—by not paying for works offered to Government; especially by National Providers.

IMPLICATIONS:

Conversely, it cannot be overemphasized, Madam RT Hon. Speaker that, Contractor being partners with Government in providing construction services (with all related value chain; such as familles, agriculture, manufacturing, supplies of all other goods and services; besides all other economic sectors that rely on such infrastructure), needed to be functionally supported as the foundation and the thrush engine for the well sang "National Transformation aspiration of 'Vision 2040' and the related NDPs." Thus, restoring confidence in the Construction Sector goes a long way in engendering the Gross National Product.

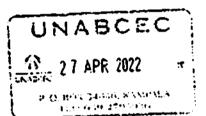
- Under your leadership, the Parliament of Uganda urgently weigh in and ensure that all these outstanding payments to Contractors are made without further delay,

REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL CASH-LIMIT AMOUNTING TO UGX 200,000,000,000 TO PAY ACCRUED DEBT UNDER DEVELOPMENT GOU AND ROAD MAINTENANCE.

VOTE 113: Uganda National Roads Authority

Reference is made to your letter dated 22nd December 2021 in which you communicated the expenditure limits for the third quarter of FY 2021/2022 under Development GoU budget amounting to UGX 188,845,181,758 to the Accounting Officer.

Further reference is made to the letter from Uganda Road Fund (URF) dated 13th January 2021 in which a cash-limit amounting to UGX 31,000,000,000 was communicated to the Accounting Officer for Road Maintenance.

However, the cash-limits communicated for Development GoU and Road Maintenance were far below the required amount to pay debt and provide for ongoing planned works for the third quarter of the FY 2021/22. Refer to the table below for details;

From the table above, it can be observed that;

- I. GOU development funding: The cash limit provided for the third quarter UGX 188.84 Billion is far below the accumulated debt of UGX 395.79Billion creating a shortfall of UGX 206.9Billion before consideration of the expected third quarter output including the financial requirement for upgrade of Children Hospital Enlebbe road project amounting to UGX 7.99Bn.
- Road Maintenance Funding: The cash limit of UGX 31Bn from URF is far below the accumulated debt totaling to UGX 142.7Billion creating a deficit of UGX 114.7Billion before consideration of the expected third quarter output.
- III. Overall UNRA is unable to pay a total of UGX 301.1Billion out of the outstanding UGX 538.5Billion creating a cash deficit of 56%.

Therefore, UNRA needs additional cash-limit amounting to UGX 200Bn with UGX 100Bn towards part payment of the debt shortfall under the Development GoU Budget, payment for upgrade of Children Hosptial Entebbe project and UGX 100Bn towards part payment of the shortfall under Maintenance as we are cognizant of the effects of the economy resulting from reduced collections from Uganda Revenue Authority (URA).

The purpose of this letter is to request your approval of additional cash-limit amounting to UGX 200Bn. Refer to the details in the annex herein attached.

STATEMENT TO THE COMMITTEE OF PARLIAMENT ON PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

BY THE HON. MINISTER FINANCE, PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

ON

DELAYED PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTORS

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Hon. Chairperson and Hon. Members,

At the 28th sitting of the 3rd meeting of the 1st Session of the 11th Parliament of Uganda held on Wednesday 04th May 2022, a matter was raised on the floor of the house on delayed payments to contractors and the resultant accumulation of interest to unacceptably high levels. Consequently, the Committee requested my Ministry to submit a list of the affected contractors and respond to the issues that may arise therein. This is therefore to draw your attention to the following:

My Ministry, consequently requested the Accounting Officers to provide details of affected contractors including the amount owed by each of them, nationality and evidence of outstanding certificates.

Additionally, in our earlier letter to the Rt. Hon. Speaker Ref. ISS 59/255/01 dated 23rd May, 2022, the Ministry submitted details of the affected contractors and outstanding certificates amounting to **Ushs** 840,868,471,074, as submitted by the respective Accounting Officers.

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2.0 UPDATH ON THE STATUS OF PAYMENTS TO THE CONTRACTORS

Hom. Chalipermor and flor. Members

At the time of appropriation of the budget for EY 2021/22, the budgetory allocations for all Votes were premised on the assumption that the economy would recover and help persone UGX 22-125 tellion in demente revenues. However, within the first quarter of execution of the budget, it become evident that that the economy continued to safter the other effects of COVID-19 lockdown and Coverament was expected to record shortfalls in revenue amounting to UGX 2 tellion.

At the same time, Covernment had during the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic increased its horrowing to 49,8% of CIDP leaving little room to cover the revenue shortfalls with debt financing given the 50% of CIDP debt celling agreed with Parliament in the Charter of them responsibility.

Cabinot therefore, took a decision to accommodate the revenue shortfalls by effecting a 40% suppression of GoL budget companent excluding wage for all Votes. Following the budget suppression, all Accounting Officers were advised to revise their work plans taking into account the reduction in resources. This was done to avoid over commitment by Government through accumulation of arrears of contractors and suppliers.

In the with the agreed (adget auppression, my Ministry has made the following release to the infrastructure Vote as listed in Table 1 below:

There are recent signs of improved economic performance since the reopening of the economy in January 2022; and Government revenue shortfalls are now projected at UGX 1.6 trillion compared to the UGX 2 trillion shortfall forecast in the First Quarter of FY 2021/22. We have since therefore, sought Cabinet decision to allow us unfreeze the budget suppression for some of the Votes affected by outstanding obligations to contractors. During the implementation of the budget for this FY2021/22, we have received appeals to the budget cuts from Accounting Officers with outstanding certificates to contractors for consideration; and these submissions were used to inform

In this regard therefore, my Ministry issued additional Expenditure Limits last FY 2021/22 in quarter four (Q4) amounting to Ushs 688,178,860,123 to facilitate outstanding Interim Payment Certificates and Invoices as summarized in the table below. Consideration of the outstanding balance will be made as revenue performance improves in the medium term.
